**Greetings American Legion Family!** 

<u>BLUF</u> – September in Wisconsin. State and National conventions are in the books. Baseball season is winding down, and football season is gearing up. The leaves are starting to fall and the nights are becoming cooler. September also signals a return to regular meeting schedules for the American Legion. Counties and Posts that took the summer off are coming together again to commence work on our annual programs and pursuing membership in earnest.

I hope everyone had an enjoyable summer. With the easing of COVID restrictions we are beginning to return to our normal routines and getting on with life. I look forward to seeing all of you at the upcoming meetings and events as we move further into fall.

Our District Christmas in August party was a rousing success. Thanks again to Frank Kresen Post 24 for hosting the event. They have a beautiful facility there in Lake Geneva, and enjoyed having us. A pleasant time was had by all, as we were able to renew our friendships and enjoy each other's company with minimum Legion business being conducted. Most of those in attendance agreed that this should become an annual event, perhaps even replacing our normal Christmas party. Stay tuned for future developments on that front.

Now on to business. We have a couple of important District events coming up, which I hope most of you will be able to attend. Our annual POW/MIA Silent March will be held on Saturday, September 18, 2021, hosted by Sponholtz – Deignan Post 183 in Genoa City. Our 1<sup>st</sup> District Fall Conference will be held on Sunday, October 3, 2021 at Wells – Davis – Young – Neal Post 209 in Orfordville. Our new Department Commander, Greg Eirich, has committed to attend both events, so I'm looking for a good turn-out of 1<sup>st</sup> District Legionnaires. As I reported in the last newsletter, we lost 668 members to non-renewal last year. We simply must find a way to reverse that trend. *Legionnaires, this is a serious call to action!* As I have shared in the past, if we are to have an organization to turn over to, when we can't do this anymore and need to step down, we have to keep our membership steady, and recruit new members. Do the math. If we continue to lose our members at the rate of 668 a year, the First District will cease to exist in less than 8 years. Is that an unrealistic assessment? Probably, but it does point out how fast things can slip away from us if we don't figure out a way to stop the slide. We can do this; I know we can. We had 5,196 members paid for 2021. If each of us recruited just <u>one</u> member, that would put us over 10,000 members, in just one year. Just one member! If half of us recruited just one member, we would become the largest District in the Department by about 1,000. The problem doesn't seem quite so daunting when you look at it like that. So, I'm asking each and every one of you to commit yourself to finding that one new member. Make sure we keep the members we have, but try as hard as you can to get one new one. There are 55,000+ potential Legionnaires in our District, including the 668 we lost last year. They are out there. From all war eras. We just need to ask. <u>GO RECRUIT THE NEXT YOU!</u>

- 4. Beware of New Telephone Scam National Headquarters received a couple of phone calls from members who have been in contact with a gentleman by the name of Billy Newman. This guy is fishing for information and tells them he is a member of The American Legion. Some have talked to him about purchasing a life membership, and he is trying to get them to provide their bank account information. On one of them, a phone number came up and the caller ID came up unavailable. National Headquarters was given the phone number from that call, and when they called the number a voicemail message says he is Billy Newman with The American Legion. THIS

IS NOT A VALID NATIONAL STAFF MEMBER OR EMPLOYEE. Do not give this individual, or anyone you don't know for that matter, your banking information over the phone.

5. Predatory Claims Companies - The American Legion and other Veteran Service Organizations (VSOs) are quite concerned about the predatory behavior of for-profit companies offering their services to veterans. They give veterans the illusion that a paid service will yield better service and results, while most of these companies are not even able to file claims as they are not accredited; some are charging veterans as much as 10 percent of their compensation for the rest of their lives.

One example of a company that charges veterans for its services is *Veterans Disability Aid, Inc.* which states on its website: "Why rely on a Veterans Service Officer (VSO) who may not have your best interests in mind? Go with the professional advocates who are committed to you and have a vested interest in your success".

These companies have been aggressively lobbying members of the U.S. Senate, and when VSOs address this issue, many senators don't understand the harm these companies are inflicting. **Veterans should not have to pay for what they have earned.** 

**6. VA processing disability claims for certain conditions related to particulate matter -** VA is now processing <u>disability claims</u> for asthma, rhinitis and sinusitis on a presumptive basis based on particulate matter exposures during military service in Southwest Asia and certain other areas – if these conditions manifested within 10 years of a qualifying period of military service.

This will expand benefits for Veterans who served in:

- Afghanistan, Djibouti, Syria, and Uzbekistan during the Persian Gulf War, from September 19, 2001, to the present, **or**
- The Southwest Asia theater of operations from August 2, 1990, to the present

If you have a pending claim for one or more of these conditions, you don't need to do anything. We'll send you a decision notice when we complete our review.

- 7. Access to VA Home Loans Expands VA <a href="https://homeloan.eligibility.requirements">homeloan eligibility requirements</a> have been updated so older Vietnam Veterans and additional National Guard members may now qualify for the no down payment home loan benefit. - **8.** Track Your VA Claim or Appeal Status Do you have a VA claim or appeal under review? You can use <u>VA's online tool</u> to review the status of any claims or appeals related to compensation, education benefits, VA health care, and more. Learn how to track your status online.
- **9. Past National Commander Denise H. Rohan –** PNC Rohan was sworn in as Wisconsin's Selective Service state director. She is the first woman to hold that title.

"I am truly honored to serve as the Wisconsin state director for the Selective Service System," said Rohan, a member of American Legion Post 385 in Verona, Wis. "Its mission is critical to national security and is an important keystone to the nation's preparedness."

Rohan's role will be to serve as liaison between the Selective Service System and the governor's office. She will represent the governor and the Selective Service regarding agency matters in Wisconsin.

Wisconsin Gov. Tony Evers nominated Rohan for the position. She was appointed by former Selective Service Director Donald M. Benton.

10. David Fuller Elected Detachment Commander - David Fuller was elected the new Detachment Commander of the Wisconsin Sons of the American Legion at the 2021 Summer Convention. David is a member of Squadron 209 located in Orfordville, WI. David follows Robert Sirovina, Jr. who was Commander from July 2019 through July 2021. Commander Fuller carries on a proud tradition being the ninth Detachment Commander from the 1st District.

One key goal Commander Fuller has set for the Detachment over the next year is more engagement with all the Squadrons within Wisconsin. A lot is changing within the Organization, the Detachment will be here to inform and supporting the Squadrons through these changes.

One other goal, through his Commander's Project, will be to help bring Closure, Gratitude, and Respect to America's senior-most Veterans by raising funds for Vets Roll. <u>Learn more here</u>.

11. Change to mask requirements at Madison VA – William S. Middleton VA Hospital in Madison has announced that all Veterans and visitors must wear a well-fitted, exam style mask to enter its hospital or clinics. The facility already requires that all staff wear a well-fitted exam mask to ensure safety against the spread of COVID-19 and all of its variants. Most community hospitals, including the UW-Madison, already have implemented similar or more strict requirements to ensure the safety of patients, staff and visitors.

When a patient arrives at one of the facilities, the screening staff will screen you for temperature and symptoms, but also check to make sure you have an appropriate, well-fitted exam style mask to wear in the facility. If you present to the facility wearing mask that is not clean, well-fitted, a gaiter or a bandana; the staff will politely offer you a facility provided exam mask at no expense and ask that you wear it throughout your visit.

This simple step will ensure consistency with mandatory face coverings across the facility and will help to make sure everyone is maintaining the safest possible environment to provide care to the Veteran patients.

**12. Meet the New National Commander -** Paul E. Dillard was elected national commander of The American Legion on Sept. 2, 2021, in Phoenix during the organization's 102<sup>nd</sup> national convention. His theme as national commander is "No Veteran Left Behind." He first joined The American Legion in 1969.

A native Texan, Dillard graduated from Whitesboro High School in 1965 before joining the U.S. Navy and serving in Vietnam through four campaigns including the Tet offensive. He later received an honorable discharge as a radarman second class petty officer from the Navy Reserve before attending Grayson County Junior College and East Texas State University. #### 13. Notes from Wisconsin American Legion Headquarters

**Post Mailings** – You all previously received correspondence that Post Mailings would be going virtual and bi-monthly. Post mailings can be viewed at <a href="https://wilegion.org/post-mailing/">https://wilegion.org/post-mailing/</a>.

**myLegion.org** – Issues with the new myLegion.org persist. Things **are** getting better, and the National organization is slowly catching up with reported problems. They are now working on individual trouble tickets, as many of the system-wide bugs have been corrected. E-mail addresses continue to be a major stumbling block for users. Users must log in with the personal e-mail that was originally on file in their National record. This information can be updated after the user's account is established in the new system. To avoid delays in membership reporting while issues are being resolved, Department is urging Post officers who process membership to use myLegion if it works, and to sent transmittals by mail, if it doesn't. This will ensure timely processing of memberships.

**3rd Annual Celebration of Freedom –** The Wisconsin American Legion announces the *2021 Celebration of Freedom* event. This year's gala will be held on September 24 – 25, 2021, and will again take place at Department Headquarters at 2930 American Legion Dr., Portage. In the first 2 years, this statewide community event has raised over \$70,000 for Legion Wisconsin Programs. What can we do with \$70,000? It could sponsor over 140 Veterans to Camp, help thousands of Veterans and their families meet their financial needs during hard times, annually send 54 Legion All-Stars to play at Miller Park or send over 200 Boys to Badger Boys State to name a few.

This is a STATE-WIDE LEGION FAMILY community event that will feature New York's 9/11 Never Forget Mobile Exhibit, live entertainment, food and drink, obstacle course and more.
